Output four

Why?

- To build resilience strengthen community cohesion and social stability
- To reduce adaptation of negative coping strategies of vulnerable families
- To contribute to the creation and rehabilitation of sustainable national resource management assets
- To adopt an integrated response to community priorities in the agriculture and environment sectors

Food for assets (FFA)

Forestry and rangeland

- 2 Nurseries rehabilitation
- 440 000 Seedlings planted
- 500 000 Seedlings produced
- 1 110 Hectares of forests and rangelands restored
- 149 700 Days of skilled and unskilled employment generated
- Forests in Irbid, Jarash, and Balqaa
Rangeland in Zarqaa, Karak, and Madaba

Agriculture infrastructure

- Canals cleaning + canals lining + gabions + water harvesting + nurseries
- 59 000 m Canal cleaning
- 5 300 m³ Canals lining
- 2 278 m³ Gabions
- 500 Participants
- Amman, Jarash, Karak, Ajloun, and Naour

To create short-term employment opportunities in two areas:

(A) Reforestation and community-based forest and rangeland management to preserve, regenerate, protect and sustainably manage the existing forest and pasture resources

(B) Improving the agriculture-related water and environmental management issues in the most vulnerable municipalities hosting a large number of Syrian refugees.
